COURSE DESCRIPTION

Rules of law govern many aspects of business. An understanding of legal rules and ethical constraints provides a framework for making sound business decisions, facilitates commercial transactions, and promotes order in the marketplace.

This course focuses on the organization and operation of the American legal system, legal rules and ethical constraints that impact business, and the practical application of these rules and constraints to real-world situations. Emphasis is placed on analytical problem solving and ethical decision making.

Prerequisite for this course: Credit or registration for Business Administration 324 or 324H.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Our study of the legal and ethical environment of business is designed to help students accomplish the following objectives:

- (1) Recognize legal and ethical issues when making business decisions.
- (2) Gain an enhanced understanding of legal rules and ethical constraints.
- (3) Improve analytical problem solving and ethical decision making skills.
- (4) Apply knowledge and skills to address and manage potential problems before they become actual, expensive problems.
- (5) Evaluate expert advice and determine the extent to which it should be incorporated into business decisions.

Class Participation

Class participation consists of cases, assigned in advance, that you brief and present in class.

Briefs: A brief is a written summary of a case. It consists of: (1) the **essential facts** (what happened between the parties and, if the case has been appealed, the decision of the lower court), (2) the **issue(s)** to be resolved, (3) the court's **resolution** of the issue(s), and (4) the **rationale** for the court's decision.

Exams

Exams are **open-book and open-note**, testing your ability to analyze hypothetical situations and determine the extent to which various legal rules and ethical constraints apply. There are **no make-up exams**. If you miss **either** exam #1 **or** exam #2, the percentage assigned to the exam you have missed will be applied to the final exam. Therefore, if you miss exam #1, your final exam will be worth 45% of your overall grade. If you miss exam #2, your final exam will be worth 55% of your final grade. If you miss **both** exam #1 **and** exam #2, the percentage assigned to exam #1 will be applied to the final exam (your final exam will be worth 45% of your overall grade), and you will receive a zero on exam #2 (worth 25% of your overall grade). **Dropping an exam grade is not an option** in this course. **Once you have taken an exam, the score is factored into your overall grade.**

Ethics Journal

Prepare a journal containing three recent news articles related to ethics and business. Produce or reproduce the articles onto 8.5" x 11" paper. Include a typewritten summary to accompany each article (one page in length, single-spaced), which: (1) identifies the ethical issue presented in the article, (2) applies the ethical principles covered in class to the facts, and (3) provides your recommendation or critique of how the issue should be or was handled. The journals should be a professional work product but binders or folders are not necessary. One staple in the upper left hand corner of your journal is sufficient. Your journal is **due at the beginning of class on Tuesday, March 20. Points will be deducted for late submissions.**

CLASS RULES
